
quad tendons away from his knee, and Nancy had carpal tunnel surgery. On behalf of all members she wishes all three a speedy recovery.




Everything had the right-of-way over rafts, which were considered cheap. The steering oar on the rafts was called a 'riff', and this transposed into riff-raff, meaning low class.

OUTING Hyde Park Barracks



On 21 April, about 30 AMPC members travelled to historic Macquarie Street, the first straight street in Australia, to see the Hyde Park Barracks. It proved to be a D-I-Y experience. However, in spite of no guides, there were some intriguing displays giving information about early Sydney.



This elegant three-storey brick building is set in its parade-ground compound. It was designed by the convict architect Francis Greenway in 1818-19 at the behest of Governor Lachlan Macquarie, and was built by convicts.

It has World Heritage Listing. Of the eleven sites in Australia so listed, three others are in Sydney: the Old Great North Road, Old Government House and Cockatoo Island.



Its original purpose was to house male convicts, including boys. AMPC members looked down a row of 20-30 comfy hammocks, and looked at similar hammock racks in the huge room, as well as in adjacent rooms on the top floor. Possibly all floors once had such hammock set-ups. No-one seemed anxious to relive the experience of those inmates, attempting to sleep so crowded together: tossing, turning, snoring, getting up nights, tripping over one another, swearing, cursing, stinking; to be woken up next day for hard labour . . . and no going off to a nice lunch in town — as all these AMPC visitors could, and most did.



One of the displays gave an inkling of the times. It showed convicts arriving from a ship, including a gentleman crim carrying a trunk. One non-British felon, behind the convict woman. Greeting them is the raggedly splendid Aboriginal identity Bungaree, wearing the Governor's cast-off clothing. In attendance is a redcoat soldier.



Another display showed the point from which the Harbour Bridge now springs to North Sydney. It was called 'Tar-ra', now Dawes Point, and it was here that William Dawes set up an observatory as directed, and near where there is an observatory to the present day. Here, too, were the defences of the settlement: Dawes Battery, for Dawes was in the Marines, with artillery expertise. Campbells Cove within Sydney Cove was known as *Meliyawool*. It was Dawes, by the way, who laid out the original street plan for Sydney, and Parramatta.







intercity train running into it, in the dark at 7.20 pm, when the 3801 had stalled, trying to climb the steep gradient from the Hawkesbury to Cowan.

Speaker Report

Bernd Anner: Growing up in China

The talk by AMPC member Bernd Anner at the 5 May 2016 general meeting was met with genuine enjoyment and appreciation. So many of us have lived all our lives in Australia with its attendant stable political situation, so Bernd's talk was new and interesting. He had lived in China through WW2 as a



boy, and then experienced the revolutionary political transfer to a communist country. This was a veritable history reading on world events, with names we all remember such as Chou En-Lai, Chiang Kai-Shek, and Mao Tse-Tung.

A panel on it states: 'A map and history of Peiping; formerly known as Peking; capital of provinces, princedoms, and kingdoms since 1121 B.C.; in 1264 A.D. the capital of the Mongol Empire of Kublai Khan; made the capital of the Ming Empire and built as it is today by Yung Lo in 1421; continued as the capital of the Chinese Empire through the Ming and Ching Dynasties; and now a city which will live long in the memory of man as one of the greatest the world has ever known.

Completed on this fifth day of February in the year of our Lord Nineteen Hundred and Thirty-six.'

As a boy Bernd seemed to do all that a 5-year-old boy does – and then some. Living in the atmosphere of the Legation (with the accepted 3 servants) within a walled diplomatic-based community, and then inside the overall walled city of Beijing, must have been an experience that probably no-one else of us has had.

When Bernd was 4-to-5 years of age, in the midst of WW2, it would have been impossible to grasp the meaning of war, but clearly some things have stayed in his mind. I'm sure bartering with the street hawkers when he was a boy would have been a good grounding for his adult life in Australia, travelling the world negotiating and buying tools for F.H. Prager, where Bernd worked for 40 years or so, and became a recognised expert in hand tools.

Bernd brought along a variety of exhibits, old books and artefacts from that period, and we were all hugely impressed with both the value and the workmanship in the silver bowl, teapot, and cutlery, which had been all designed by his father, and made by craftsmen in his father's business.

From this first part of Bernd's story we see that hardship and privation doesn't hurt anyone, and he seems so relaxed and contented in Australia.

So, thank you Bernd for such an enthralling and totally different talk, and we will never again complain about our toast being burnt!*

Dolls Sweatshop

Every so often a number of members of the AMPC brigade meet at the home of Barbara Williamson to craft dolls. Not just the paltry few dolls seen on the table below, but hundreds of them. Probably thousands of them by now. They are knitted to a basic pattern, but because each is hand done, and because of different wool thicknesses and different styles of the knitters, each one is different.



Around the table: Mystery Volunteer, Rosemary Davies, Pam Clarke, Sunny Dougall and Jennie Gambell. Others turned up later.

First there is the knitting of the basic doll. Then there is stuffing. Then there is shaping with stitches to form the arms and legs. Then a label is sewn on, to show that the doll is the work of the AMPC team. And then they go off to get their personalities, when in a separate sweatshop the eyes



and mouths are added, and they practically spring to life. When all is done they are given to the Westmead Children's Hospital, and then, one by one, to the children. Soft toys, warm hearts.


In due course jigsaws and DVDs were added, following the same sharing principle.
