





# Cowra Tour Report

On Tuesday the twenty fourth of September twenty four people, mostly from our club, set off from



Hornsby with our coach driver, Brad. We stopped at the tourist information office in Glenbrook where we had tea and biscuits. We were soon off to Mayfield gardens near Oberon where we stayed for over two hours. The sixteen hectares gardens are privately owned but open to the public. They are beautifully laid out with lakes, vistas, fountains, waterfalls, a stone chapel and a cafe and produce shop. We

wandered around, enjoying each of the themed garden areas before enjoying refreshments at the cafe. Next stop was Bathurst where we had a brief look around. On the way out we did a quick circuit of Mount Panorama - well not that quick, Brad, very responsibly, stuck to the speed limit but it was fun as he pointed the parts of the circuit and the speeds we might be doing if racing. Then it was off to our motel in Cowra where we stayed for the three nights of the trip. The motel belongs to the RSL

Club, which is across the street. The club itself is where we had breakfast and dinner in our own private dining room. All meals were great quality.

Cowra was the site of a large POW camp during the Second World War, housing Japanese, Italian and



Indonesian prisoners. One night over a thousand Japanese prisoners broke out of the camp. Over 300 prisoners died, and five Australians were killed in the breakout and recapture operation. As a result Cowra now has many ties to the Japanese nation forged in the post war years. Our first day was spent in and around Cowra exploring the extensive and tranquil Japanese gardens, designed by a renowned Japanese gardener, the visitors' centre, and the Japanese war cemetery.

Next day we headed out of Cowra. The first stop was McFeeter's Motor Museum, in

Forbes, a large and stunning collection of motor cars and cycles dating from 1905 to more modern times. We had a guided tour which was very interesting, even to a non-enthusiast like myself. After morning tea at their café we headed off to look around the town of Forbes. Then the town of Parkes. First we visited the Henry Parkes Centre and the Parkes museum where we saw a few more motor cars, lots of farm machinery, a film about Henry Parkes' life and achievements and some Elvis exhibits

(the town hosts an Elvis weekend once a year), and other things related to the district. Then we went to the main attraction of Parkes which is the radio telescope. The radio telescope is famous for being used to receive the TV pictures of man's first walking on the moon, from where it was transmitted to the rest of the world. This event was the further popularised in the movie "The Dish". On the journey from Parkes to our motel we had a quick stop in Eugowra, a small town which has a number of the large murals on the sides of some of the buildings.



Friday, the last day was upon us. We packed our bags into the coach and set off. Along the way we visited a fudge and jam factory/shop, a distillery/shop and a cherry orchard, all of which were interesting. We had lunch at Maccas at Yass. Then the freeway back home.

In the late evening, we pulled into Hornsby. Overall it was a very busy and interesting trip. The weather was good, for us at least, but the local people desperately need rain. Good food, fun and good company.

# Hawkesbury River Cruise Report

Thursday the 19<sup>th</sup> was a relaxing and enthralling day of contrasts. Sydney's recent deluge of rain had stopped and the weather was mild.

Forty-five of us left Brooklyn pier in a large catamaran called the Sorrento.

We were greeted by our guide, Peter Rea, who then proceeded to give a passionate, knowledgeable and fascinating talk on the history of Broken Bay and its surrounds.

We learnt that this pristine and peaceful part of our riverside bush land, initially discovered by Captain James Cook in 1770 and then explored by Governor Arthur Phillip in 1788, was once the scene of some crucial Navy defense installations designed to protect the East Coast Railway from invading enemy forces.

As a weak point in the north/south railway line, the bridge over the Hawkesbury presented an opportunity for disrupting the flow of supplies and armaments from Sydney to Brisbane in WWII.

Peter pointed out gun emplacements, a battery observation point, concrete bunkers, an amenities hall, an inclined railway and the remains of other military structures.





We sailed over the wreck of H.M.A.S. Swan and saw what was left of the hull of the H.M.A.S Parramatta – both mighty warships in their time. It was hard to believe that enemy submarines, destroyers and numerous other naval vessels once sailed these peaceful waters.

We were all held spellbound by Peter's expert presentation and the beauty of this lovely part of the world, so close to home.
