January 18th Summer Lunch on the Waterfront at the Newport Hotel

We will enjoy good company, fabulous views & good food at The Newport Hotel. The former Newport Arms has been revitalised in 2023 and we have booked the shaded "Tree Area" for lunch. Travel will be by public transport or drive yourself.

- The Newport, 2 Kalinya Street, Newport.
- Order & pay for your meals on the day. No prepayment. Prices from about \$20 to \$35+
- If driving, we suggest arriving about 11:30 to get undercover parking at the Hotel, otherwise there is limited public parking around the streets. People with limited mobility can be dropped off at the ramp leading to the reserved garden area.
- The **199 Bus** or **L90 Bus** stop at the Hotel's front door. Catch the bus from Pittwater Road or Barrenjoey Road
- Public transport:
 - o **9:46am** Train from Hornsby to Gordon
 - 10:15am 197 Bus Gordon station Bus Stop A to Pittwater Place Shopping centre Mona Vale. Walk 100 meters to Barrenjoey Road
 - 199 Bus from B-Line stop 210323 in Barrenjoey Road to the Newport Hotel (frequent service)

In February, our speaker will introduce an element of romance into the ownership of electric cars.


In March, Hornsby Fire & Rescue will provide an overview of operations and vital safety advice for all homeowners.
