The bank statement. It is difficult to give a ruling because there is no consistency between banks.

In the good old days, the banks listed every name you had including Mr, Mrs, etc which now take up valuable space. If you use EFT as a means of paying people, it would be a good idea to check with your bank and make sure you only have one Christian name (perhaps an initial) and your surname so that there is room for the surname to print on the receiver's end of your transactions. The name on the account is printed loud and clear although it sometimes misses the surname completely.

There seems to be two spaces where one can write the name of the activity. Please put it in both as every bank is different and it is not easy to ascertain which spot will print on the receiver's bank statement.

Once you have made a transaction, please print the bank receipt. For those who use a tablet or phone to make a transaction, and the only available option is to print a receipt (NAB for example), write "no receipt" on the Activities Payment Voucher.

Payments should be made at our monthly meetings. They can be in cash (please tender the correct amount if possible), cheque or by EFT and should be accompanied by a completed Activities Payment Voucher. If paying by EFT this should be done prior to the monthly meeting so that the EFT receipt can be submitted at the monthly meeting.

If you are unable to attend the next general meeting email the bank receipt together with a completed Activities Payment Voucher to the Assistant Treasurer, If attending the meeting there is NO need to email your receipt to Dianne. Attach a copy of the receipt to your completed Activities Payment Voucher and hand them both to the Payments Desk who will initial your receipt and return it to you. The receipt should then be taken to the activity organiser so your name can be marked as "paid" on their list.

If paying for several activities in one payment you need to complete a separate Activities Payment Voucher for each activity.

Please note that if your payment is made after the monthly meeting prior to your activity it may be too late to include your attendance at that activity as venues are often paid in the week following the meeting.

Visit to Prince Henry Hospital Nursing and Medical Museum.

On Thursday 17th June, 23 members braved the wintery conditions (cold winds but no rain fortunately) to tour the precinct of the old South Coast, later becoming the Prince Henry Hospital at La Perouse. After a very noisy and chatty train, light rail and bus trip we were met by a very informative and very passionate ex nurse, Adrienne. Then having had a rather welcoming morning tea the tour began.

One of the old wards has been done as a museum, one end being a huge open area (as wards were in the old days) has been set up in a "themed" decade fashion. The theme being the most prevalent condition/event of that time. For example, diphtheria, polio, WW1, WW2 etc, including up to HIV/AIDS. There even happens to be room to create a Covid-19 display in the future.

The other end of the building was the specialty areas such as operating theatre, dispensary, dental surgery, pathology lab and a cardiac (heart) treatment area that has a working iron lung from yesteryear.

It was amazing to see the the vast quantity of old equipment, both mechanical and electrical they have on display, thankfully to some nurses who rescued them from going to the tip when there was a massive clean up after years of neglect.

We then proceeded to the nurse's chapel which had a huge glass window, with lovely stained glass, that gave beautiful view out to sea across the bay. I think parishioners would have been more distracted with the view rather than what the preacher was saying.

Then after a bite to eat at the cafes across the road we proceeded home.

FOOTNOTE: One of our members who was with us on the day, served some of her nursing days in that exact same ward.

Definitely a place worth visiting.

Red Centre away trip

16th to 22nd June 2021.

Around 46 seniors, including 16 members of Asquith Mixed Probus Club toured with 'On Course Tours' to Australia's Red Centre, enjoying crisp, but dry days, with the only rain being on the day we headed back home.

Accommodation along the way was more than satisfactory with good food and friendly hosts at our 3 different locations; and this was necessary due to the vast distances covered, enabling us to visit many of the varied sites and features out in 'the Red Centre'.

Credit goes to Yenda Holland, who selected 'On Course Tours' to organize the trip, and they certainly provided a full week of visits to interesting places, sites and memorials. In our 7 days we saw the sights of Alice Springs, went to Anzac Hill, the Telegraph Station Historic Reserve, Desert Park – with a 'great birds of prey' show, the John Flynn Historical Reserve, the Stunning Standley Chasm, and that dramatic crack in the Quartzite ridge – Simpsons Gap.

Overlooking Alice Springs is the colourful Macdonell Ranges, with dazzling hues changing from pink to mauve, to ochre, on its sparsely vegetated ridges. Quite enchanting. Albert Namatjira certainly captured these colours.

We visited the Royal Flying Doctor Base, The School of the Air, the Cultural Precinct including Araluen Galleries – Museum of Central Australia - Aviation Museum, Spirit of the Outback Dinner and Show. We pressed on to Kings Canyon, Curtis Springs Station, and on to Uluru (Ayres Rock), followed by Kata Tjuta (The Olgas), and the Field of Lights. Pheww!

So, a very full week away, seeing most of the 'Red Centre's' essential inland sights, shows and landscapes. Certainly, a trip not to be missed

Walk: Meadowbank to Kissing Point

On Thursday 27 February, a beautiful cloudless day, around forty AMPC members took part in the monthly outdoor outing organised by Laurie Keaton. It began for most at Hornsby Station, where the train took them to Meadowbank where the walk proper began. The party followed the railway south then with some roadwork difficulty crossed over it and continued south until Meadowbank's Memorial Park, so named for a pathway flanked by 42 small pillars, each named for a country Australia fought in during WW2, each capped with a fragment of stone from that country.

The bank of the Parramatta River was next, a little further on, from where could be seen the elegant 2016 Bennelong Bridge spanning Homebush Bay, linking Rhodes to Wentworth Point, for the exclusive use of walkers, bike riders, and buses. Bennelong and bridges were to be the focus of the next part of this AMPC adventure.

The group progressed along the river embankment, which offered a close-up view the 'new' John Whitton railway bridge that most had often thundered over in the train. An original railway crossing here was an 1886 lattice truss bridge by Whitton, 'father of NSW railways'. By the 1950s a new bridge was needed and piers for it were constructed in 1952. Work stopped until the 1970s when the piers were extended to provide for the laying of additional tracks, something that has still not taken place. The 'new' bridge was finally opened in 1980. The original Whitton bridge, restored in 2000 for bikes and walkers, had been closed again by 2021 for further restoration.

And so the AMPC party continued on along the embankment, marvelling at the many new high rises and changes Sydney's population growth had brought about, until they came to Ryde bridge, with its two distinctive light metal towers on the 1935 structure, that once enabled a section of the roadway to be lifted for shipping.

There was a bit more to this walk, but this is enough. Jeremy Steele

A new concrete bridge was added to this crossing, opening in 1988.

After passing under the Church St/Concord Road highway the pathway led the party past Settlers Park with a 1948 historic plaque,

to Waterview Street in the suburb of Putney. Some members might have been surprised by heading into the backstreets at this point, going left into Princes Street, and then turning right into the undistinguished Watson Street.

Once outside a singularly unremarkable house, No 25 Watson Street, Putney, it was disclosed by Laurie Keaton that this very house stood on land that once formed part of the estate of the First Fleet convict brewer, James Squire. This enterprising

figure eventually amassed 30 acres

of holdings at Kissing Point, by which name this reach of the river had come to be known.

Jeremy Steele then being called upon, he told the group that Bennelong, the most famous of all historical Aboriginal figures, was believed to be buried in the nature strip or front garden of this very house. For this reason, when it came on the market in late 2017, it was acquired by the State government. Steele spoke of Bennelong's names, sisters and wives (who included *Barangaroo* and



Gurubarabula), as well as his two known children, and of Bennelong's fights, woundings and other exploits.





PROGRAM/SPEAKERS

Members enjoyed a fascinating interactive talk by Jim Haynes at the June meeting. Amongst other things we heard about the only two times the Australian Defence Forces were called out to fight a war on Australian soil. The first was in Broken Hill during WW1 when two 'Ghans' attacked the Picnic train going to Silverton, one was an ice cream vendor and the other a local imam and halal butcher. We heard that the background was a little more complicated than these bald statements imply. 
