### **REPORT ON PROBUS HARBOUR CRUISE ON FRIDAY 30 SEPT 2022**



On Friday 30 Sept, Probus members took part in a Harbour cruise organized by the Naval Historical Society. We commenced by sailing past the Maritime Museum and saw the destroyer HMAS Vampire and the submarine HMAS Otway. We saw the replica of Cook's Endeavour and were amazed how small it was for the vast voyages it undertook.

On the way over to HMAS Waterhen at Waverton the guide outlined the important role that mines have played in naval operations. We sailed past the four RAN coastal minehunters. They are made of fibreglass to give a low magnetic signature and for increased shock resistance. They use sonar to detect mines and a ROV to inspect mines and destroy them.

Next, we sailed around Cockatoo Island and heard of its vital role in building ships in wartime operations. We then saw Spectacle Island and Snapper Island. These islands are not open to the public but have important histories.

The narration by the speakers from the Naval Historical Society was very well informed and illustrated by most interesting projected slides. Although each season has its own special charm, autumn is particularly beautiful with the mountains cloaked in rich veils of gold and red. We will spend a leisurely 3 days taking in many of the spectacular gardens of the region as well as exploring some of its fascinating towns and villages. Oberon is an interesting town surrounded by state forests and rich grazing country.

A highlight of the tour will be the amazing Mayfield Garden, one of the largest cool climate gardens in the world. It is beautifully designed with manicured lawns, a rose walk, a rhododendron walk, a maze, a croquet lawn, parterre garden, aviary, conservatorium, orchard, vegetable garden, water garden, obelisk, chapel and many more treasures at every turn.

We will travel to Oberon on the Bells Line of Road to Mt Tomah Botanic Gardens where we will enjoy a picnic lunch before continuing on to Mt Wilson. Our return will see us travel over the Great Western Highway taking in all the autumn colour on offer at Blackheath, Leura and Wentworth Falls.

Our accommodation is at the Big Trout Motor Inn at Oberon and our host, will guide us through the region on roads less travelled. At an elevation of over 1,100 metres, you will feel Oberon's crisp cool air doing you good with every breath!

# OBERON IN AUTUMN 3 DAY ITINERARY

### DAY 1

This morning we will enjoy morning tea at Windsor before continuing along the Bells Line of Road through Kurrajong and Bilpin to the Blue Mountains Botanic Gardens at Mount Tomah. The garden was established in 1972 and contains 28 hectares of manicured gardens within a further 120 hectares of native vegetation. It is administered by the Botanic Gardens Trust and there will be time to stroll through the gardens and take in the sublime views from the Visitors Centre.

Our next destination is the delightful village of Mount Wilson which we will explore on the coach with a "Behind the Hedges Tour" before our inspection of the beautiful Windyridge Garden. Roger Davidson owns the garden and designed it in conjunction with landscape architect Gordon Sykes. It showcases a fabulous array of cool climate plants and has become one of the most popular gardens in the mountains. We will enjoy a delicious picnic lunch under the gazebo. This afternoon we will travel across to Oberon on the Darling Causeway through Mount Victoria and historic Hartley. We will arrive at the Big Trout with time to relax before our 3 course dinner at 7.00 pm.

### DAY 2

Following a hearty country breakfast we will head to the amazing Mayfield Garden which is sure to be one of the highlights of the tour. It is one of the largest privately owned cool climate gardens in the world, nestled within a 5,000 acre working farm. Although a young garden it is sure to delight. The Water Garden is open year round but each year in autumn and spring the entire 160 acres is open to explore. We will take in the Chapel at the top of the site and then roam through the Rose Garden, The Aviary, The Walled Kitchen Garden and the spectacular 80 metre cascade.

After our picnic lunch today at the Oberon Common we will be joined by our local guide. Maria McGrath's family has been farming in the region for 6 generations and currently has over 4,000 acres of wheat and sheep. Maria will focus much of her town tour on the thriving timber industry and we will see several of the enormous mills that operate around the clock. We will also take in the Oberon Dam before enjoying some time to explore the town on foot. We will return to our motel around 5.00pm with dinner again being at 7.00 pm.

### DAY 3

This morning we will travel to Blackheath with morning tea at the Memorial Rhododendron Gardens. We will then visit the excellent Katoomba Fine Art Gallery which always has an excellent range of landscapes on display along with some more unusual pieces of artwork.

Our next destination is the National Trust's Everglades Garden which is an absolute picture in the spring. This treasure from the 1930s, designed by Paul Sorensen, spans 12 ½ acres with breathtaking views over the Jamieson Valley. Following our lunch at Leura we will have a little time to explore the Leura Village with its many fine shops and galleries before continuing on to Wentworth Falls to take in more sublime mountain scenery. We return to Sydney along the Great Western Highway approx 5.30 pm.
