





REPORT ON GARDEN ISLAND DOCKYARD HERITAGE TOUR

The weather was beautiful for our tour of Garden Island, the location of our Royal Australian Navy (RAN) base. At the commencement of our tour we experienced an informative 15minute video on the history of Garden Island. We were then split into three separate, guided groups.

We learnt that not long after the HMS Sirius arrived in Sydney Cove a kitchen-garden consisting of onions and corn was established on Garden Island for the Sirius crew. We visited the Garden Island Naval Chapel, beautiful and very moving. We were extremely lucky to see the HMAS Canberra in dry dock for maintenance. Garden Island has been host to a naval base since 1856. Today, Garden Island forms a major part of the RAN's Fleet Base East.

Garden Island was originally a completely detached island but was joined to the Potts Point shoreline by major land reclamation work during World War II. We all commented that we did not realise the size of GI. We followed our tour with a pub lunch at Woolloomooloo and then made our way home.

9.04 am train from Hornsby platform 3, arriving Central station 9.44 a.m. Catch the 9.52 am Light Rail L1 (Exit 1 Grand Concourse) to Pyrmont Bay, arriving 10.02. Short walk to Maritime Museum.

Each of these tours is about 1hr in duration. After the tour, you are free to explore the rest of the vessels and exhibitions at your own leisure. There are numerous places to have lunch at Darling Harbour or coffee/lunch at the Museum's Cafe.

HMAS VAMPIRE

HMAS Vampire is a tour on board a navy destroyer. Access onto the vessel is conditional based on mobility. Pushers are not allowed on any of the vessels for safety reasons. Walking sticks are permitted, however, please note that there are steps and slopes that need to be navigated, so it might be difficult.

The volunteer guide will show visitors the different parts of the galleries and some of the highlights in each one. Because objects get rotated for conservation, these tours differ slightly depending on which exhibitions/objects are on display during the visit. PARRAMATTA FEMALE FACTORY

17th APRIL, 2025 11.00 am

This Governor Macquarie & Francis Greenway site was once home to at least 5,000 convict women transported "beyond the seas". Hear the inspiring stories of the women's lives, learn about their survival, their legacy and much more.

Tour duration 1hr - 1.5 hrs. Closed-in walking shoes must be worn. There are a few places on the site where the ground is uneven, or you need to step over a gutter. Make sure if it is hot to bring water, hat and sunscreen.

*Please note these travel times are not definite. Travel will depend on tides and whether or not the Parramatta Light Rail is operational at this time.

Catch the 8.51 am train from Hornsby (Platform 3) to Strathfield - arrives 9.15 am. Change to Platform 6 for the 9.18 am train to Parramatta - arrives 9.31 am.

Then catch the Free Parramatta Bus Shuttle 900 (Corner of Church & George Street) to Parramatta Leagues Club (runs every 15 minutes) - easy 10minute walk to Parramatta Female Factory, 5 Fleet Street, North Parramatta. (After Leagues Club, turn left at Fennell Street this runs into Fleet Street.)

Return trip RiverCat or by train.

 the historic Cable Station building, once Australia's only link to the rest of the world. Almost 2,000

GRIFFITH SPRING FESTIVAL AWAY TRIP



Why would you want to go to Griffith? Well

We travelled down inland through lovely green farming country. James, our driver, was a font of knowledge and provided

wonderful, informative commentary. First stop was Bill the Bastard (the warhorse

sculpture).

Next day we visited Catania Fruit Salad Farm and learned about farming in the area. This farm has over 60 different types of fruit and nuts and the mud brick home was built in 1912. Here we learned the following interesting facts:

Naval oranges are winter oranges; Valencias, eaten when green, are summer oranges.

There are more antioxidants in prunes (sugar plums) than broccoli or red grapes.



Local gardens were a feature of the spring festival and we visited five of them - one or two were really on acreage and absolutely stunning. The prominent flowers were beautiful roses and irises. Grape seed and hay were used as mulch in most instances.

The Altina Wildlife Park was a real surprise. There were lots of small animals, an air conditioned shed for crocodiles and animals such as bison

and foxes that I had never seen before. The means of transport was unique and fun and the guides were enthusiastic and full of interesting information. They

demonstrated how to do a health check on a lion.


The Southern Cotton Gin was another highlight. Unfortunately, it was in maintenance mode but the guides explained the process beautifully. The process takes 60 seconds from beginning to end –

separating stalks and leaves, separating seeds, then baling. Each bale can be traced back not only to the property, but to the section of the property on which it was grown.



We had another unique train ride round Pioneer Park, a community effort to preserve original cottages and other memorabilia from the area. There

is also an Italian Museum on site. Not nearly enough time to explore it all. Another highlight was a walk through the unique citrus sculptures and a wine tasting.
